

MEMPHIS WELCOMES YOU TO THE 1992 STAA MEETINGS PRELIMINARY PROGRAM: SOME HIGHLIGHTS

We are enormously pleased with the enthusiastic response to the 1992 SfAA program. The rich offerings reflect your committment to participation. Following SfAA tradition, the program committee has combined several types of activites which nicely complement each other. Formal symposia, poster sessions, awards ceremonies and receptions, committee meetings, panel discussions, forums, workshops, excursions to anthropological sites, and tours offer something for everyone. We have tried to balance the seriousness of the formal program with interesting—but still serious—SfAA-Organized Excursions and Workshops. At the same time, we will offer you an opportunity to take an organized tour. Or you may very well want to explore the city, take a riverboat cruise on the Mississippi River, or find music on Beale Street on your own time and in your own way. We will provide lots of helpful information about restaurants and music after you arrive in Memphis.

We are especially pleased to present the *first SfAA* research poster session in which we will recognize the research of graduate students in applied anthropology program. Departments were invited to nominate a student from their master and doctoral programs; as a result, twenty students from fifteen departments will exhibit their work on Saturday morning in the Mezzanine of the Peabody Hotel. Please set aside some time between 9:00 AM and 1:00 PM to see their work.

Through the course of the meeting, we will be honoring four anthropologists in special symposia: M. Margaret Clark, Robert A. Hackenberg, Marion Pearsall, and Demitri B. Shimkin. The winner of the second annual Peter Kong-Ming New Student Award will be recognized on Thursday. On Friday evening the Malinowski Award will be presented to M. Margaret Clark at the Awards Ceremony and Reception. We happily anticipate her address. And for the first time, a Career Award will be given at the meetings: William Foote Whyte will receive this award on Saturday, at which time he will be available to talk informally with students and faculty.

When we look at the overall program, it is clear that participants have taken into account the theme of the meeting—Regional Research and Development: Domestic and International Perspectives—in planning symposia. Those regions which are explicitly represented in sessions include Alaska, the Northern Plains, the High Plains, Southern California, the Mid-South, Washington, D.C., Latin America, Northern Andes, Central and Eastern Europe, India, Bangladesh, China, Africa, and Oceania. It is worth noting that on Saturday we will have an opportunity to hear scholars from the People's Republic of China and American China scholars present papers and discuss issues regarding "facilitating exchanges with China" and "recent anthropological work in China."

Spurred on by the very productive series of sessions in the 1991 meeting in Charleston, we have organized a disaster research symposium consisting of four sessions and an excursion to the Memphis State University Center for Earthquake Research and Information. Perhaps not surprisingly, medical anthropology is extremely visible in the program, with three AIDS symposia and thirteen other medical anthropology symposia. Issues regarding anthropology and gender are also well represented: four organized symposia, two workshops organized by the Memphis State Center for Research on Women, and an exhibit of the Research Clearinghouse on Women of Color and Southern Women. Please take a close look at the preliminary program and the notes which precede it. Now is the time to make necessary changes, as well as any important additions. It is also a good time for you to sign up for Workshops and SfAA-Organized Excursions. Reservations should be made as soon as possible at the Peabody Hotel. You will be hearing from us again in February with details about the tours (organized by Unique Tours) and some more touristic information about Memphis.

In case you can't tell, we are looking forward to seeing you here in Memphis.

- ** For those individuals who mailed their abstract after December 1, your abstract may not be included in the preliminary program. Please don't panic, but do contact the program chair just to be sure you are included in the final program.

- ** Presentations which are part of **forums, panels,** and **roundtables** are typically limited to approximately ten minutes, and much of the session time is devoted to discussion. Chairs of such sessions are given leeway to vary the specific format, however.
- ** Roundtable Discussions are open, and anyone registered for the meetings is welcome to take part. No separate registration or sign-up is necessary.
- ** Workshops require an advanced registration because the number of participants who can be accommodated is limited to 15 people. We are charging \$10 for all but one workshop to cover the cost of preparation of materials. (Please see enclosed list and description of workshops and registration form.) Advanced registration can be made through the SfAA Business Office in Oklahoma City by March 5. Please do make your reservation by this date so we can plan accordingly.
- ** SfAA-Organized Excursions also require an advanced registration since the number of participants who can be accommodated is limited. These excursions cost \$10 each to cover transportation expenses. (Please see enclosed list and description of these excursions and registration form.) Advanced registration can be made through the SfAA Business Office in Oklahoma City by March 15.
- ** Tours organized by Unique Tours and the Center for Southern Folklore require an advanced registration.

 Advanced registration will be made through the Unique Tours' office in Memphis. You will receive a flyer with information about these tours and reservations in February.
